

What Can I Do At Home?

Every school will be providing/delivering instruction to help students prepare for the test during and after school. But there are some things that you and your child can do at home to prepare:

WRITING CHECKLIST	
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- Use the print materials you already have at home (magazines, newspapers, comic books, posters, flyers, brochures, catalogues, websites) to practice reading
- Talk about what you've read, and how it connects to what's going on in the world
- Watch films and TV shows, and practice making predictions, asking questions, clarifying something or making a comment about what you've read/seen
- Become familiar with the instructions on the Literacy Test by accessing www.EQAO.com and trying the sample tests!

The OSSLT has been designed to “determine whether a student has the reading and writing skills required to meet the standards of the *Ontario Curriculum* across all subjects up to the end of grade nine.”

(OSSLT: Framework)

All secondary schools will be publishing a special schedule for the test day. Individual schools will be providing specific information regarding the afternoon class schedule and any transportation changes closer to the test date.




PREPARING FOR THE TEST

QUESTION TYPES AND TIPS:

Short Writing Tasks:

1. **Read and reread** the question carefully. Ask yourself: “What’s the **main idea**?”
2. Always use **specific and relevant details and information from the reading selection**, along with your personal knowledge and experience in your answer.



Series of Paragraphs Stating an Opinion

1. **Brainstorm!** Use the *Rough Notes* section to organize your ideas: list reasons and examples to support your opinion. Ask yourself:

Why do I agree or disagree?

2. **State your opinion** in the 1st paragraph—make it clear that you agree or disagree.
3. Write at least **2 body paragraphs**, explaining your reasons and providing examples.
4. Write a **conclusion** where you restate your position and summarize your main ideas.

Open-Response Questions:

1. Think of **links** between the topic and your knowledge and personal experience.
2. Answer the question using **specific details and relevant information** from your personal knowledge and experiences. Give concrete examples!

The Newspaper Report

1. **Brainstorm!** Look at the picture closely and jot down details of what you see in the *Rough Notes* section to **answer: Who? What? Where? When? Why? and How?**
2. Your **opening paragraph** needs to be 1-2 sentences long, and answer: **Who? What? Where? and When?**
3. **The body paragraph(s)** can answer the **Why? and How?**
4. The conclusion should also be short (1-2 sentences), and could answer the question: **What will happen next?**
5. Use a **direct quote** in your report.
6. Always write in the 3rd person (he, she, it, they, etc.) Do not use the word “I.” Remember, **you** are not part of the story!

Multiple Choice Reading Questions:

1. **Underline or circle key words** in both the question stem & the choices.
2. **Always read all of the choices**, even when the first or second choice looks correct.
3. Think of multiple choice as a series of **true/ false** statements.
4. **Use the process of elimination.** Cross off all choices which you know are false.
5. **Answer every question.** Making an educated guess is acceptable and encouraged!

Best Practices in EQAO: EQAO recognizes that some students may need a bit of extra time to complete the test booklets, as is common practice in classrooms across Ontario.
